Dear Mayor Rickman and City council,

My name is Alex and I am a registered voter in Tracy, CA. I am writing to you today to ask what you are doing, as the mayor and city council, to ensure that your officers are not abusing their power and are held accountable for their actions.

After witnessing the death of George Floyd at the hands of the Minneapolis Police Department, I am left feeling outraged, frustrated, and hurt. The system has failed yet another black man and we are anxiously waiting to see if the officers responsible for his death will face consequences.

As a resident of Tracy, I want to make sure that my local police department is taking the necessary preventative measures to ensure that incidents like this will not occur in the future. So I ask:

- Are the police officers in the Tracy Police Department being trained to de-escalate altercations by using peaceful conflict resolution strategies?
- Are the police officers in the TPD forbidden from using carotid restraints (chokeholds, strangleholds, etc.) and hog-tying methods? Furthermore, are they forbidden from transporting civilians in uncomfortable positions, such as face down in a vehicle?
- Are the police officers in the TPD required to intervene if they witness another officer using excessive force? Will officers be reprimanded if they fail to intervene?
- Are the police officers in the TPD forbidden from shooting at moving vehicles?

- Is there a clear and enforced use-of-force continuum that details what weapons and force are acceptable in a wide variety of civilian-police interactions?
- Are the officers in the TPD required to exhaust every other possible option before using excessive force?
- Are the officers in the TPD required to give a verbal warning to civilians before drawing their weapon or using excessive force?
- Are the officers in the TPD required to report each time they threaten to or use force on civilians?
- Are the officers in the TPD thoroughly vetted to ensure that they do not have a history with abuse, racism, xenophobia, homophobia / transphobia, or discrimination?
- Are the officers in the TPD trained to perform and seek necessary medical action after using excessive force?
- Is there an early intervention system enforced to correct officers who use excessive force? Additionally, how many complaints does an officer have to receive before they are reprimanded? Before they are terminated? More than three complaints are unacceptable.

Statistics have indicated that by enforcing these policies, there is a significant decrease in civilian complaints and injury due to excessive force. If any of the policies are not currently in place, then what is being done to ensure that they are going to be enforced in the near future? What can I do, as a concerned citizen, to set these policies in motion?

I also want to increase the level of trust between the police department and the community. To establish trust, there has to be transparency. I would like to see the Tracy Police Department collect and report data on civilian deaths that occurred in custody and as a result of an officer's use of excessive force. The data should be broken down by demographics and should showcase the race, gender, sexuality,

and religion of the civilians. Allowing the public access to this information will show us where we, as a community, fall short.

Thank you for your time and I hope that we can work together to protect the Tracy community.

Dear City Council,

I would like to express my support for requiring the wearing of face coverings at businesses and the Farmers Market in Tracy.

While there is lots of chatter online about the efficacy of wearing a mask, the science shows that reducing the spread of aerosols and droplets has been proven to combat the asymptomatic spread of COVID-19.

To quote from the an article published 27 May 2020 on [sciencemag.org](https://science.sciencemag.org/content/early/2020/05/27/science.abc6197) (link below/PDF attached):

Infectious aerosol particles can be released during breathing and speaking by asymptomatic infected individuals. No masking maximizes exposure, whereas universal masking results in the least exposure.

I encourage the counsel to review this article and use fact-based science to make their decision. It would be unfortunate if we were forced to shut back to this fall when (not if) a second wave of infections hit. Many of the Asian countries have proven that masks have cut transmission rates while letting them keep their economies open.

Letting everyone decide on their own sounds nice, except it does nothing to protect us from asymptomatic spreaders. As a society

and republic, we agree to give up some personal liberties for the common health. This includes wearing shoes and shirts in food establishments, not allowing non-service animals into the market or restaurants, and requiring food safety procedures.

*Assuming SARS-CoV-2 virions are contained in submicron aerosols, as is the case for influenza virus, a good comparison is exhaled cigarette smoke, which also contains submicron particles and will likely follow comparable flows and dilution patterns. **The distance from a smoker at which one smells cigarette smoke indicates the distance in those surroundings at which one could inhale infectious aerosols.***

Note that even when someone is smoking outside, at least we can smell it and move away. COVID-19 doesn't afford us that luxury before it makes us sick.

Reducing transmission of SARS-CoV-2

Masks and testing are necessary to combat asymptomatic spread in aerosols and droplets

Respiratory infections occur through the transmission of virus-containing droplets (>5 to 10 μm) and aerosols ($\leq 5 \mu\text{m}$) exhaled from infected individuals during breathing, speaking, coughing, and sneezing. Traditional respiratory disease control measures are designed to reduce transmission by droplets produced in the sneezes and coughs of infected individuals. However, a large proportion of the spread of coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) appears to be occurring through airborne transmission of aerosols produced by asymptomatic individuals during breathing and speaking (1–3). Aerosols can accumulate, remain infectious in indoor air for hours, and be easily inhaled deep into the lungs. For society to resume, measures designed to reduce aerosol transmission must be implemented, including universal masking and regular, widespread testing to identify and isolate infected asymptomatic individuals.

Humans produce respiratory droplets ranging from 0.1 to 1000 μm . A competition between droplet size, inertia, gravity, and evaporation determines how far emitted droplets and aerosols will travel in air (4, 5). Respiratory droplets will undergo gravitational settling faster than they evaporate, contaminating surfaces and leading to contact transmission. Smaller aerosols ($\leq 5 \mu\text{m}$) will evaporate faster than they can settle, are buoyant, and thus can be affected by air currents, which can transport them over longer distances. Thus, there are two major respiratory virus transmission pathways: contact (direct or indirect between people and with contaminated surfaces) and airborne inhalation.

In addition to contributing to the extent of dispersal and mode of transmission, respiratory droplet size has been shown to affect the severity of disease. For example, influenza virus is more commonly contained in aerosols with sizes below 1 μm (submicron), which lead to more severe infection (4). In the case of severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2 (SARS-CoV-2), it is possible that submicron virus-containing aerosols are being transferred deep into the alveolar region of the lungs, where immune responses seem to be temporarily bypassed. SARS-CoV-2 has been shown to replicate three times faster than SARS-CoV-1 and thus can rapidly spread to the pharynx from which it can be shed before the innate immune response becomes activated and produces symptoms (6). By the time symptoms occur,

the patient has transmitted the virus without knowing.

Identifying infected individuals to curb SARS-CoV-2 transmission is more challenging compared to SARS and other respiratory viruses because infected individuals can be highly contagious for several days, peaking on or before symptoms occur (2, 7). These “silent shedders” could be critical drivers of the enhanced spread of SARS-CoV-2. In Wuhan, China, it has been estimated that undiagnosed cases of COVID-19 infection, who were presumably asymptomatic, were responsible for up to 79% of viral infections (3). Therefore, regular, widespread testing is essential to identify and isolate infected asymptomatic individuals.

Airborne transmission was determined to play a role during the SARS outbreak in 2003 (1, 4). However, many countries have not yet acknowledged airborne transmission as a possible pathway for SARS-CoV-2 (1). Recent studies have shown that in addition to droplets, SARS-CoV-2 may also be transmitted through aerosols. A study in hospitals in Wuhan, China, found SARS-CoV-2 in aerosols further than 6 ft from patients with higher concentrations detected in more crowded areas (8). Estimates using an average sputum viral load for SARS-CoV-2 indicate that 1 min of loud speaking could generate >1000 virion-containing aerosols (9). Assuming viral titers for infected super-emitters (with 100-fold higher viral load than average) yields an increase to more than 100,000 virions in emitted droplets per minute of speaking.

The World Health Organization (WHO) recommendations for social distancing of 6 ft and hand washing to reduce the spread of SARS-CoV-2 are based on studies of respiratory droplets carried out in the 1930s. These studies showed that large, $\sim 100 \mu\text{m}$ droplets produced in coughs and sneezes quickly underwent gravitational settling (1). However, when these studies were conducted, the technology did not exist for detecting submicron aerosols. As a comparison, calculations predict that in still air, a 100- μm droplet will settle to the ground from 8 ft in 4.6 s whereas a 1- μm aerosol particle will take 12.4 hours (4). Measurements now show that intense coughs and sneezes that propel larger droplets more than 20 ft can also create thousands of aerosols that can travel even further (1). Increasing evidence for SARS-CoV-2 suggests the 6 ft WHO recommendation is

likely not enough under many indoor conditions where aerosols can remain airborne for hours, accumulate over time, and follow air flows over distances further than 6 ft (5, 10).

In outdoor environments, numerous factors will determine the concentrations and distance traveled, and whether respiratory viruses remain infectious in aerosols. Breezes and winds often occur and can transport infectious droplets and aerosols long distances. Asymptomatic individuals who are speaking while exercising can release infectious aerosols that can be picked up by air streams (10). Viral concentrations will be more rapidly diluted outdoors, but few studies have been carried out on outdoor transmission of SARS-CoV-2. Additionally, SARS-CoV-2 can be inactivated by ultraviolet radiation in sunlight, and it is likely sensitive to ambient temperature and relative humidity, as well as the presence of atmospheric aerosols that occur in highly polluted areas. Viruses can attach to other particles such as dust and pollution, which can modify the aerodynamic characteristics and increase dispersion. Moreover, people living in areas with higher concentrations of air pollution have been shown to have higher severity of COVID-19 (11). Because respiratory viruses can remain airborne for prolonged periods before being inhaled by a potential host, studies are needed to characterize the factors leading to loss of infectivity over time in a variety of outdoor environments over a range of conditions.

Given how little is known about the production and airborne behavior of infectious respiratory droplets, it is difficult to define a safe distance for social distancing. Assuming SARS-CoV-2 virions are contained in submicron aerosols, as is the case for influenza virus, a good comparison is exhaled cigarette smoke, which also contains submicron particles and will likely follow comparable flows and dilution patterns. The distance from a smoker at which one smells cigarette smoke indicates the distance in those surroundings at which one could inhale infectious aerosols. In an enclosed room with asymptomatic individuals, infectious aerosol concentrations can increase over time. Overall, the probability of becoming infected indoors will depend on the total amount of SARS-CoV-2 inhaled. Ultimately, the amount of ventilation, number of people, how long one visits an indoor facility, and activities that affect air flow will all modulate viral transmission pathways and exposure (10). For these reasons, it is important to wear properly fitted masks indoors even when 6 ft apart. Airborne transmission could account, in part, for the high secondary transmission rates to medical staff, as well as major outbreaks in nursing facilities. The minimum dose of SARS-CoV-2 that leads to infection is unknown, but airborne transmission through aerosols has been documented for other respiratory viruses including measles, SARS, and chickenpox (4).

Airborne spread from undiagnosed infections will con-

tinuously undermine the effectiveness of even the most vigorous testing, tracing, and social distancing programs. After evidence revealed that airborne transmission by asymptomatic individuals might be a key driver in the global spread of COVID-19, the WHO recommended universal use of face masks. Masks provide a critical barrier, reducing the number of infectious viruses in exhaled breath, especially of asymptomatic people and those with mild symptoms (12) (see the figure). Surgical mask material reduces the likelihood and severity of COVID-19 by substantially reducing airborne viral concentrations (13). Masks also protect uninfected individuals from SARS-CoV-2 aerosols (12, 13). Thus, it is particularly important to wear masks in locations with conditions that can accumulate high concentrations of viruses, such as health care settings, airplanes, restaurants, and other crowded places with reduced ventilation. The aerosol filtering efficiency of different materials, thicknesses, and layers used in properly fitted homemade masks was recently found to be similar to that of the medical masks that were tested (14). Thus, the option of universal masking is no longer held back by shortages.

From epidemiological data, countries that have been most effective in reducing the spread of COVID-19 have implemented universal masking, including Taiwan, Hong Kong, Singapore, and South Korea. In the battle against COVID-19, Taiwan (population 24 million, first COVID-19 case 21 January 2020) did not implement a lockdown during the pandemic, yet maintained a low incidence of 441 cases and 7 deaths (as of 21 May 2020). By contrast, the state of New York (population ~20 million, first COVID case 1 March 2020), had a higher number of cases (353,000) and deaths (24,000). By quickly activating its epidemic response plan that was established after the SARS outbreak, the Taiwanese government enacted a set of proactive measures that successfully prevented the spread of SARS-CoV-2, including setting up a central epidemic command center in January, using technologies to detect and track infected patients and their close contacts, and perhaps most importantly, requesting people to wear masks in public places. The government also ensured the availability of medical masks by banning mask manufacturers from exporting them, implementing a system to ensure that every citizen could acquire masks at reasonable prices, and increasing the production of masks. In other countries, there have been widespread shortages of masks, resulting in most residents not having access to any form of medical mask (15). This striking difference in the availability and widespread adoption of wearing masks likely influenced the low number of COVID-19 cases.

Aerosol transmission of viruses must be acknowledged as a key factor leading to the spread of infectious respiratory diseases. Evidence suggests that SARS-CoV-2 is silently spreading in aerosols exhaled by highly contagious infected

individuals with no symptoms. Owing to their smaller size, aerosols may lead to higher severity of COVID-19 because virus-containing aerosols penetrate more deeply into the lungs (10). It is essential that control measures be introduced to reduce aerosol transmission. A multidisciplinary approach is needed to address a wide range of factors that lead to the production and airborne transmission of respiratory viruses, including the minimum virus titer required to cause COVID-19; viral load emitted as a function of droplet size before, during, and after infection; viability of the virus indoors and outdoors; mechanisms of transmission; airborne concentrations; and spatial patterns. More studies of the filtering efficiency of different types of masks are also needed. COVID-19 has inspired research that is already leading to a better understanding of the importance of airborne transmission of respiratory disease.

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



Subject: The use of medical masks in the community may create a false sense of security

There is limited evidence that wearing a medical mask by healthy individuals in the households or among contacts of a sick patient, or among attendees of mass gatherings may be beneficial as a preventive measure. However, there is currently no evidence that wearing a mask (whether medical or other types) by healthy persons in the wider community setting, including universal community masking, can prevent them from infection with respiratory viruses, including COVID-19.

Medical masks should be reserved for health care workers.

The use of medical masks in the community may create a false sense of security, with neglect of other essential measures, such as hand hygiene practices and physical distancing, and may lead to touching the face under the masks and under the eyes.

In review of the proposed mandate to require wearing masks in essential business, I would like your consideration to exclude teaching staff of CA licensed child care center and home based providers serving children. The State of CA has already provided rigid regulations including social distancing, and to include the wearing of face masks in the care of children can potentially cause short and long term mental health implications.

Parents are already aware of the policies and regulations in place, and have signed admissions agreements for their children to be present in the care of a teacher without a mask.

I've gotten calls today from business people concerned about the face mask ordinance you guys are trying to implement. The concerns range from "what will I do if a customer refuses to wear a mask- I don't want a scene at my place of business and I don't want the City coming after me" to "how long will this law be on the books". You guys might want to consider a few things.


1. Making it crystal clear that a business person will not face any liability vis-a-vis the City if a customer refuses to wear a mask as long as all the proper notices are posted.
2. Have the ordinance sunset in 90 days. If near the 90 day period COVID is still a big problem, folks will be more willing to go along with another 90 day extension.
3. Consider a health and safety exception to the mask rule. For example, I have had about 4 clients that own restaurants that are concerned about the health of their cooks in having to wear masks while working over a hot grill, broiler or deep fryer. Having worked in my family's restaurant in the kitchen, from when I was 12 until I went to law school at 23, wearing a mask in a very hot kitchen during a rush would have been asphyxiating. Perhaps

requiring wellness checks at the beginning of a shift including taking temperatures of employees and documenting it in lieu of masks for those kinds of situations? I have a form that I've developed that all of my restaurant clients are in the process of implementing for all employees, both front of the house (wait staff, buspersons, hosts and hostesses) and back of the house (kitchen staff and dishwashers). I will send it to you later tonight to give you an idea of how it works. It's simple and only one page. Very user friendly.

I'm just passing these suggestions along to you so Tuesday doesn't turn into a circus, both at the virtual dais and from the virtual podium.

Hi Jenny.

I am not sure if you will have a chance to return the message that I left for you earlier today before tomorrow's meeting, but there is one more thing I wanted to bring to your attention on the proposed face mask ordinance.

In California, there is a statute, **Business & Professions Code Section 17200** ("B & P Section 17200"), which allows a third party to sue a person or business that engages in unfair or unlawful business practices. This statute has been broadly interpreted by California courts so that the violation of a federal, state, county or local law, rules, regulation, ordinance or order can form the basis of a lawsuit under B & P Section 17200. Under B & P Section 17200, a party is allowed to collect attorney's fees.

The concern my clients and I have are this: by passing the ordinance mandating face masks to be worn at all times within "essential businesses", such as a restaurant or auto repair shop, you can open a business up to liability for a B & P Code Section 17200 lawsuit if any of its patrons are not wearing a face mask, even if social distancing protocols are being followed. In the case of restaurants, where people go to eat and drink, people would have to take their masks off when seated. All you need is some one to snap a picture of that on their cell phone, even if social distancing protocols have been implemented and use it in conjunction with an unscrupulous attorney to file a lawsuit against that business as part of a shakedown. Just like you have unscrupulous attorneys that have filed countless of lawsuits under

the American with Disabilities Act ("ADA") for technical violations of the ADA, who then shake down businesses to settle for anywhere between \$3,000.00 to \$10,000.00 to drop their "drive by" ADA lawsuit, the face mask ordinance could expose businesses to similar "drive by" lawsuits by unscrupulous attorneys for technical violations of the ordinance to shakedown businesses that have already been dealt a severe blow by the COVID shelter-in-place orders by filing a B & P Section 17200 lawsuit against a business.

Although I understand the intent of the proposed face mask ordinance is well-placed, I would strongly suggest that the City slow down and really take a hard look in terms of how it is drafted. You do not want to be doing something that could be weaponized and used against businesses, which are already on the ropes financially and emotionally, in the form of a lawsuit by greedy and unscrupulous individuals.


